Following the formation in 2009, Rahmatan lil 'Alamin Foundation (RLAF) has focused its efforts toward developing a caring and compassionate society. This is expressed through building the capacities of our youth via training programmes to be passionate, competent and ready to participate in humanitarian and community service programmes or projects locally and beyond. We support community development and service projects by youth groups that demonstrate their potential of making a difference to the lives of the beneficiaries while helping them to build their volunteering capabilities. Another key focus area is providing support and collaboration in projects by MUIS, mosques and other organizations that seek to further promote the ethos of bringing blessings to all.

One common denominator in all the above key thrusts is that the participants and beneficiaries of the projects come from challenged communities and they can be from any race, colour or creed. This is in line with the operating philosophy of the foundation to be an agency that is truly a blessing to all.

Continuing to pursue the three core thrusts in 2018, we are pleased to be able to conduct well attended training programmes that offer our youth insights into preparing them to be effective and versatile humanitarian activists. Our training programmes also benefitted youth from diverse sectors and those from the ASEAN region. We were able to do this through collaboration with international partners namely the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) and the Red Pencil Humanitarian Foundation.

The Singapore Muslim community continue to demonstrate their readiness and care for others through generous contributions to RLAF's fundraising efforts for communities in neighbouring countries that experienced natural disasters and conflicts. Help to these communities were delivered through our partnering agencies who work with local agencies in the affected areas.

RLA Day 2018 was also a special highlight for the year. For the first time the RLAF, working in collaboration with the mosque sector, organized the event outside the mosque complex. It was also the first time that we hosted our special guests, the migrant workers at the Marina Barrage to recognize and appreciate their contributions to building and development of Singapore. The event also involved many agencies, organisations and of course the participation of many mosque volunteers from all the mosque clusters.

Finally, the Foundation can be only as good as the support that it gets from the community. I wish to thank the Singapore Muslim community and the larger Singapore society for their contributions and support that had enabled us to touch hearts and enrich lives of many communities locally and abroad throughout the year. With your continued support, we can endeavour to be a force for good and a blessing to all.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE



2018 was an active and invigorating year for Rahmatan lil Alamin Foundation (RLAF) with a rich mix of programmes and events that filled the year, which coincides with the 50th Anniversary of the Islamic Religious Council of Singapore, the agency that established the foundation.

The first of four capacity building programmes for the year was a first in many ways for the foundation. It was the first time that our international humanitarian partner, the UNHCR, collaborated with RLAF to organise a 2-day workshop entitled “Foundations of an Effective Humanitarian Volunteer”. It was also the first time such a training was organised involving 39 participants from nine ASEAN countries with half being Singaporean humanitarian volunteers and youth activists.

Following this very enriching programme, RLAF representatives were hosted by the UNHCR to visit Rohingya refugees and observe programmes in the Kutupalong camp in Cox’s Bazar for Rohingya refugees who fled to Bangladesh.

While the first three quarters of the year were quiet months on humanitarian disaster, we had our hands full in assisting four natural disasters that saw many loss of lives and properties in Laos, Lombok, Kerala and Sulawesi which happen in quick succession during the last quarter of the year. We are happy to be able to contribute over S\$800,000 in total and are still working with local and ground partners to determine the post-relief work for these disasters.

The foundation was also busy on the grant-giving front where it received 11 youth projects seeking to champion different causes such as empowering children of incarcerated families and building self-esteem amongst challenged students in Singapore, educating children of refugees in Malaysia, and helping in the recovery process of environmental degradation in coastal areas in Lombok and Sumatra, among others. Project implementers involved a good mix of NGO’s, social enterprises, madrasahs and institutions of higher learning.

As part of the 50th Anniversary of MUIS, for the first time RLAF and the mosques in Singapore organised the RLA Day in a public venue, namely the Marina Barrage. This year we hosted the migrant workers in Singapore as our special guests to pay tribute and accord recognition to their hard work and contribution to the building of Singapore and supporting of Singaporean families. RLAF also set up exhibits on its work in Singapore and beyond at a MUIS 50 event entitled “Salam Singapore” as part of a public exhibition which showcased MUIS and its institutions.

All in all, it was a truly busy and satisfying year. We were able to touch many lives and empower many youths to touch many more hearts and enrich many more lives through their projects supported by RLAF. With the support of the Muslim community and the larger Singapore society, we can continue to be a force for good and radiate the culture of care and compassion for many years to come.

CORPORATE OBJECTIVES

The Rahmatan Lil Alamin Foundation is a registered charity and has been conferred an Institution of Public Character (IPC) status. It was incorporated with the following objectives:

1. To support capacity building of community leaders, youth leaders and volunteers through skills upgrading and training to undertake the above mentioned RLA projects;
2. To promote and support activities & programmes that project the Rahmatan Lil' Alamin (RLA) or Blessing to All spirit; and
3. To promote better understanding and cultivate stronger bonds amongst people of various faiths in Singapore through humanitarian & community development works so as to strengthen inter-faith understanding and race relations in Singapore.

POLICIES: Finance & Funding

The Foundation is financially supported by grants from MUIS as well as donations from individuals, corporations and organisations.

During the year, the Foundation embarked on projects and activities in the three core thrusts of the Foundation as stated below:

1. Organise and support youth capacity building programmes
2. Facilitate and fund community projects that help build a caring and compassionate community
3. Facilitate humanitarian relief efforts by raising funds, principally from the Muslim community and, to a lesser extent, from the larger Singapore society for specific humanitarian disaster relief and rebuilding assistance in communities around the region and beyond.

The funds received are subsequently disbursed through the partnering relief organisations that operate in the affected areas as articulated in the appeal.

Staffing

As at 31 December 2018, two (2) full time staff were deployed to the Foundation. No staff remuneration is paid or payable by the Foundation, as the two (2) staff are seconded and paid by an external organisation, MUIS.

YOUTH CAPACITY BUILDING

The main activities of the Foundation is to provide capacity building and empowerment opportunities for young volunteers and activists who are keen and interested in community development and humanitarian causes. 110 young volunteers were developed through four training programmes held during the year namely:



Foundations for an Effective Humanitarian Volunteer

36 youths from nine ASEAN countries including Singapore had the opportunity to learn new skills in becoming an effective humanitarian worker. The participants were volunteers, community service and humanitarian activists. This programme was organised in collaboration with the United Nations Refugee Agency's (UNHCR) Training Centre based in Bangkok.

Held over 27-28 January 2018, the participants learnt new skills relating to planning, coordination, implementation and monitoring of humanitarian projects. They also shared their skills and experience in doing similar work.

Design Thinking & Project Management

The two-day workshop engagement which was held in April 2019 is a design thinking and project management programme that targets potential youth activists who wish to make a difference through championing and



leading different social projects. The key focus within this program is “development” – which is the deliberate and intended effort towards providing the youths with the skills in creative problem solving through design thinking approach, as well as the skills in managing projects.

The participants were equipped with skills such as understanding the importance of design thinking in solving problems in all areas, how to engage them to explore, think and brainstorm on the different social and community issues in Singapore and also to equip them with effective techniques and skills in managing social and humanitarian projects within Singapore.



Art Therapy: Facilitating Healing of Survivors of Abuse & Trauma

The one-day training was held on 7 July 2018 at Harmony Centre. The workshop equipped 40 young volunteers with understanding and experience through theory and hands-on directives on how art therapy can help children, youths and families affected by abuse and trauma - which are especially important for volunteers in development work. The training was held in collaboration with our new partner, The Red Pencil Humanitarian Foundation.

It opened my eyes to understanding more about the training subject and unpack what it is about exactly and challenge my understanding of it. The workshop has a balanced approach of theoretical learning and role play that apply some of the framework. It has given me an increased sense of self-awareness and challenge my self-biasness. I walk away from this workshop with a set of tools that I can apply depending on different scenarios - both in my personal life and at work.

Psychological First Aid

In partnership with Singapore Red Cross Academy, we organised a one-day Psychological First Aid (PFA) workshop for 16 volunteers on Saturday 20 October 2018. The participants consist of volunteers from RLAF, Masjid Yusof Ishak, NGOs such as Save the Children and social enterprises such as The Kain Project and The Widaad Project.

PROJECT GRANTS

We facilitated and fund community projects that help build a caring and compassionate community. We provided grant support for community development and humanitarian projects by youth groups, student associations in tertiary institutions, social enterprises and other registered youth entities.

A total of \$229,150 in grants was approved in 2018 to 11 project teams to carry out humanitarian and community developmental projects for local and overseas beneficiaries. Projects range from local empowerment of youth-at-risk and under-performing students to education-driven projects in Vietnam and Cambodia. The projects were evaluated through the impact of the projects, capacity building of volunteers, project management, financial management and their sustainability.

The supported projects help to enhance the knowledge and competencies of the project participants as well as the beneficiaries and plant seeds of sustainability in improving the lives of the communities reached. We also continue to advise and monitor project teams especially in fine-tuning their project submissions in terms of improving the rigour and impact of their project.

Internal Capacity Building

Separately, RLAF also views it as critical to have our lean management team to be further empowered with skills and competencies through training, workshops and conferences. In 2018, the management team attended seminars such as “A Resilient South East Asia - A Red Cross/Red Crescent Seminar” organised by Singapore Red Cross Society. Our two full-time officers also went on a project monitoring trip to visit Rohingya refugees in Kutupalong Refugee Camp, Cox Bazar, Bangladesh arranged by the UNHCR.

Separately, Izhar Roslan, Senior Manager for Capabilities Development attended a content creation workshop conducted by Google Singapore and Global Leader Series for non-profits by National Council for Social Services and was one of the panellist in the SG Youth Walk-the-Talk Series. Irdawaty Abdul Kadir attended a seminar on “Ethical Issues in Risk Management” conducted by ISCA and Charity Governance Conference organised by MCCY’s Charities Unit.

HUMANITARIAN RELIEF FACILITATION

A total of \$808,409 was raised in 2018 in aid of humanitarian relief efforts to disaster stricken communities in the following countries. The total amount collected was channelled and disbursed through partnering with relief organisations for specific relief and post-relief causes specified in the public appeal.

Lombok Earthquake/Laos Flood

A powerful 6.9 magnitude earthquake hit Indonesia's Lombok Island on 5 August 2018 while a dam collapsed in Laos' Attapeu province on 23 July 2018 had resulted in massive floods. The devastating earthquake and floods contributed to widespread damage of infrastructures, as well as loss of lives and properties with thousands made homeless as a result of the disasters.

Kerala Flood

Severe flooding and scenes of devastation affecting the Indian state of Kerala due to unusually high rainfall during the monsoon season. The flood, which was categorised as the worst in nearly a century, had claimed 445 victims and displaced a million people. Additionally, more than 10,000 kilometres of roads were destroyed or damaged and wiped out 50,000 houses.

Sulawesi Earthquake & Tsunami

A powerful 7.4 magnitude earthquake hit the Indonesian island of Sulawesi on Friday 28 August 2018, triggering a three-metre tsunami which contributed to widespread destruction of infrastructure, loss of properties and significant loss of lives. According to reports, the death toll crossed 1,200 and will continue to rise, with thousands more made homeless by the natural disasters.



MONITORING VISIT

POST-RELIEF PROJECTS: Women Empowerment and Education of Children of Rohingya Refugees in Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh

RLAF again collaborated with UNHCR to manage the crisis through various projects. The funds are channelled to programmes that include women empowerment, education of Rohingya children, community engagement and distribution of daily essentials. The team went on a monitoring visit to the Kutupalong-Balukhali refugee camps in Cox's Bazar in March 2018.

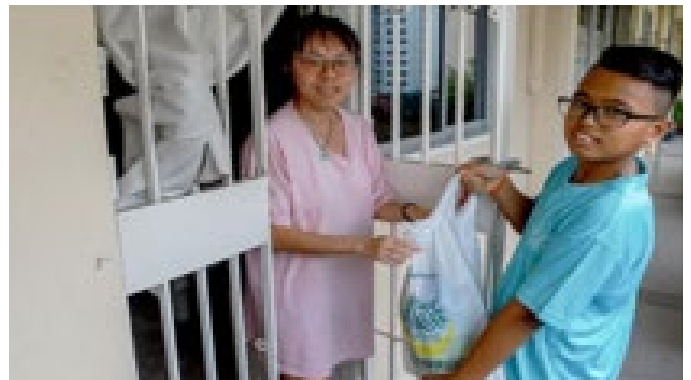

RLA DAY 2018



The annual Rahmatan Lil Alamin Day, funded by the Foundation, is one key initiative that spreads awareness and showcases manifestations of the “Rahmatan Lil Alamin” (RLA) spirit – a core Islamic tenet to the wider community beyond the mosque. Over the years, the RLA Day had adopted different themes which seek to emphasize diverse manifestations of the RLA ethos such as Food for the Needy, Healthy Lifestyle and Family, Adoption of Welfare Homes, Greening and Building Community Cohesion.

In addition to our focus on lending a hand, RLA also champions the protection of the natural environment, another ethos consistent with being a good Muslim. The Foundation realizes that it is the people who make up a community who are most able to create future change, and set in motion a culture of blessings that will benefit all.

For 2018, RLA together with the South Mosque Cluster (SMC) organized an RLA Day 2018 event that was held on Sunday, 18 November 2018 at the Marina Barrage, with the theme “Appreciating Humanity- Together”. The organising committee chose to involve the migrant/foreign workers and new Singaporeans of diverse ethnic backgrounds to be our special guests as a way to demonstrate our recognition and appreciation of their efforts to build and prosper Singapore through their work and sacrifice. It is an indication that we value their presence and contribution in facilitating the diverse facets of our lives in Singapore which in turn demonstrate our act of being a gracious host to an important resource that we may have largely taken for granted.

Unlike previous RLA Days where the main activities were carried out at the mosques, Marina Barrage was proposed as the location for this year’s programme. This is to allow the RLA message to go beyond the mosque. The surroundings and green setting of the barrage also provided for a relaxing day out for the foreign workers who would welcome this respite after a hard work week. In addition to the migrant/foreign workers, we also invited mosque and MUIS volunteers, representatives of Muslim organisations, interfaith groups and welfare homes that have worked closely with the mosques.

Having the exhibition at Marina Barrage also allowed the general public to peek through the booths that was set up to showcase the work of RLA and its partners in promoting healthy and harmonious living as well as efforts at caring for the wellbeing of our foreign workers.

The key components of the programme RLA Day 2018 included:

Staying Healthy - Together

Health is one of the blessings of life that we should always be thankful for and that we should strive to maintain that will enable us to have a fulfilling and meaningful quality of life. As such, this element continued to be an integral part of the RLA Day celebrations. This is made more meaningful, when we involved many diverse segments of the community and society, including our foreign workers. To kick start the 2018 RLA Day, a mass light warm-up exercise was conducted by officials from the Health Promotion Board (HPB).



This was then followed by a mass brisk-walking activity around the vicinity of the Marina Barrage. Participants were paired with special guests from welfare homes adopted by the mosque clusters as well as from other charitable organisations. Through such activity we also demonstrate to our foreign workers the value of social cohesion that we hold dearly in Singapore.

Radiating Compassion

During the programme, RLA shared some first-hand efforts by our mosques to facilitate the socio-religious needs of our foreign workers. We handed out special grants to two mosques that curated and implemented social and skills enrichment programmes for our foreign workers and domestic helpers. In addition, project grants were also offered to youth groups who submitted approved projects to help improve the lives of challenged communities here and abroad.

Building Bonds of Humanity

No efforts to build a caring community is complete without a meal together with all those who were involved in the RLA Day initiatives. For this segment, we had the VIPs and volunteers from the mosques to serve a meal to our foreign worker guests while engaging them.



Beyond the RLA Day

The activities of the RLA Day signified the kick off for the four mosque clusters to follow-up with many other RLA initiatives until the next RLA Day in 2019. This included keeping in touch with the dormitory management within the vicinity of the mosque clusters where foreign workers reside as well as to organise programmes that will help bring some cheer and joy into the lives of the workers as they toil to develop Singapore forward.

Beyond this, the mosque cluster will continue with many of the existing RLA activities that they have been organising at the local level including home adoption, greening efforts, blood donation, food for the poor and many more. All with the support of the Foundation and a special RLA collection on a Friday at all the mosques in Singapore.

FUTURE PLANS AND COMMITMENTS

Consolidation and Publicity of RLAF's works (2009-2018)

RLAF plans to consolidate the reports for humanitarian and youth projects supported by grants from the Foundation, as well as report on RLA Days in the run-up to the RLAF's 10th anniversary in 2019. This will include reviewing and refining reporting templates and organising a photo archival and retrieval system for purposes of record-keeping and marketing and communications. Management will also enhance the RLAF brand and undertake a review of the RLAF action plan to chart the way forward as part of its 10-year review.

Encouraging More Local Projects

RLAF will continue to actively reach out to institutions such as the universities, polytechnics, ITEs, madrasahs, mosques and youth organisations to create a greater awareness of its objectives and grants for humanitarian and community development projects with greater emphasis on local projects.

More Inter-Community Involvement

RLAF wishes to encourage involvement of the larger Singapore society working together with the Muslim youths in implementing community development and service projects. This will help to further strengthen inter-community cohesion through humanitarian and community development work. This will contribute significantly to building a more caring and cohesive society.

Build Pool of RLAF Volunteers

RLAF hopes to increase its own volunteer base by increasing the pool of young activists as Friends of the RLAF as well as via social media. Gradually, it hopes to attract more applicants to be RLAF volunteers/activists especially those who are domain specialists in the diverse areas of community development work. The alumni of projects supported and conducted by RLAF would be an important source of volunteers.

Strive for Greater Financial Sustainability

RLAF will put in more effort in striving to achieve greater financial sustainability through more systematic and conscious effort in fund raising and prudent financial management. This will require new resources to focus on marketing and fund raising efforts.

Strive for Good Governance

In terms of transparency and governance, RLAF ensures that all standard of procedures and code of governance are adhered to and submission of documents to the relevant authorities or agencies are administered promptly and with due diligence.

REVIEWS

Review Of Financial State and Explanation of Major Financial Transactions

Review and Changes in The Policy

Policy on Conflict of Interest

The Board of Trustees have established a Conflict of Interest Policy to assist in identifying and managing potential conflicts. Trustees make their declaration of interest as necessary at each Board meeting conducted during the financial year for any situations of conflict that may arise and these trustees will abstain from decision-making in such instances so as to allow a fair and transparent decision-making process. Management carry out their daily duties independently from the trustees.

Policy on Reserves

The Board of Trustees of the Foundation have considered the level of operating activity and its annual operating expenses and is of the view that there are sufficient funds to ensure that the Foundation's operational activities could continue during a period of unforeseen difficulty.

The Foundation is not subject to externally imposed reserves requirement.

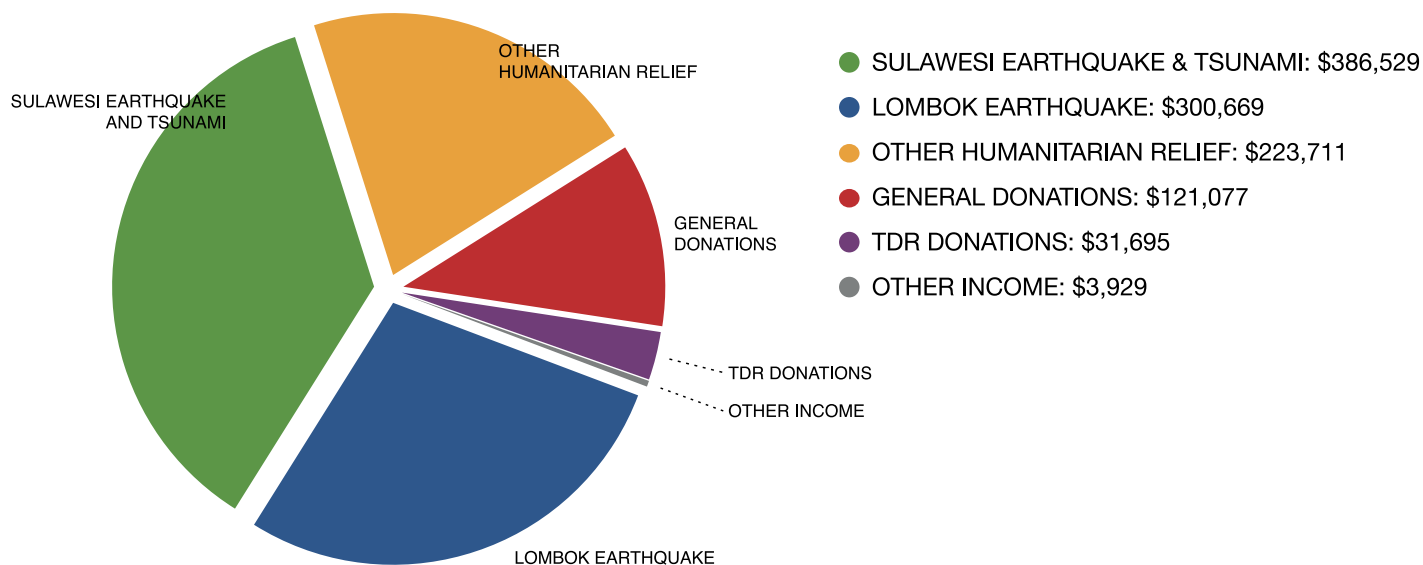

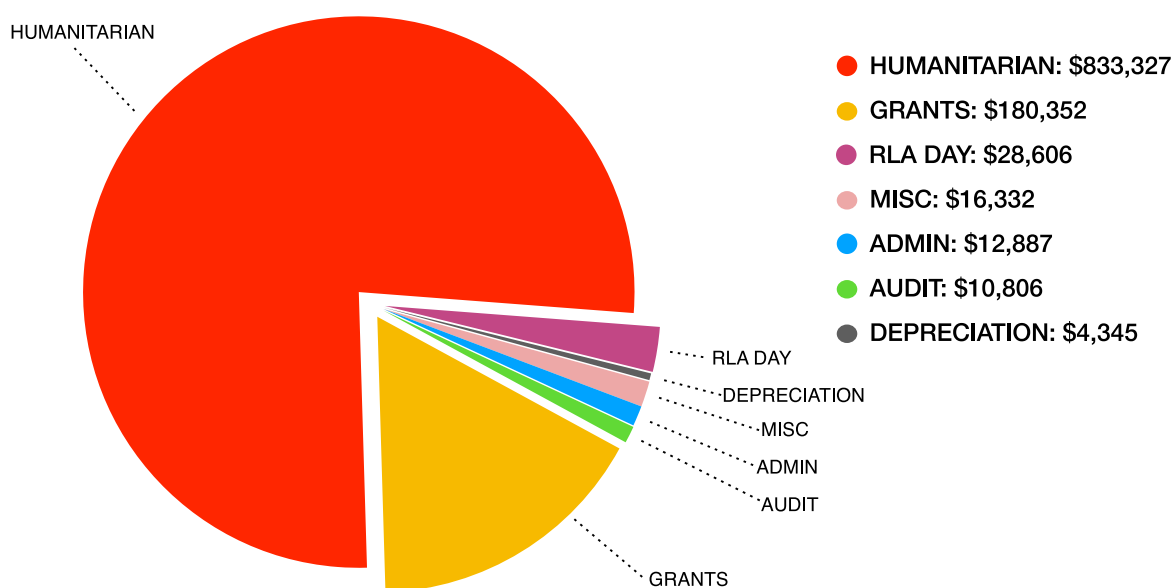
